Epiphany: An ancient Greek word meaning a manifestation – a revealing of something or someone. Today we celebrate the revealing of Jesus to the Wise Men from the east – the beginning of the revealing of Christ to everyone in every nation, in every time.

"What mixed motives and thoughts where in the minds of those who had seen the star that guided them to the baby Messiah? 'Wise Men from the East', that is non-Jews were drawn to follow diligently, probably for years together, until they found their goal and presented those famous gifts: gold, frankincense and myrrh. Strange gifts for a child, and ones that people spend centuries pondering interpreting: gold for a king, frankincense for the anointing of a priest, myrrh for suffering and death. In truth they were all gifts associated with kingship. These travellers from the East recognised the kingship of this child and they bowed down to worship in the only way they knew how. The experience filled them with joy - one of the gifts of God, poured out upon them as they gave their own gifts. And King Herod? He sought the Christ child also, but he knew nothing of the joy of these other seekers. He was filled with fear, and it led him to plot complex methods to get rid of Jesus. Joy and fear; following and avoiding: we see these responses to Christ right at the beginning of the Gospel, just as we do today, in ourselves. As you see God revealed again this Epiphany, how will you respond?" Ricarda Witcombe wrote this about the Epiphany story in Sunday Link, January 6th 2008.

Prayer: Holy God, reveal yourself afresh in our lives and in the world, and give us grace to put away our fears and to know the joy of true worship. Amen
